Pre-Operative Foot Surgery Information

- You will need to be seen by Dr. Davis within 30 days prior to your surgery, per hospital regulations.
- Make sure you contact your employer for FMLA paperwork and/or disability paperwork if needed <u>before</u> the surgery. Please make certain there is a fax number included for where to return the paperwork.
- <u>Stop blood thinners five days prior to surgery</u>; unless you were instructed differently. This includes Aspirin, Advil, Coumadin (Warfarin), Ibuprofen. Tylenol can be taken for pain, if needed.
- <u>DO NOT</u> eat or drink anything after midnight the evening prior to surgery.
 - You may take blood pressure medication the morning of surgery with a *very small sip of water*.
- If you have Asthma or COPD, bring your inhaler to use *prior* to surgery.
- It is best to have ice packs available (frozen peas work well).
 - Have three or four packs available and ready to use.
- If you are diabetic, take HALF of your morning insulin -OR- contact your Primary Care Physician or Endocrinologist to manage your blood sugars around the time of surgery.
- Please arrive approximately 1 and ½ hours early to surgery to start an IV. The anesthesiologist will ask you questions and prepare you for the surgery.
- <u>Make sure you have your CAM boot and crutches, or knee scooter ready before surgery.</u> You may be able to obtain a knee scooter from Apria at 1-888-492-7742.
- It is best to have a friend or family member available for 1 2 days after surgery and sometimes longer, depending upon the surgery.
- You will follow-up with Dr. Davis at The Foot Clinic at *one week, two weeks, four weeks, and typically eight weeks after your surgery*.
- You will need to keep your foot dry two weeks after surgery until the sutures are removed at The Foot Clinic.
- You can purchase a "Cast Dry" <u>(A plastic sleeve to keep the foot dry)</u> at local pharmacies. This keeps your incision(s) dry during bathing.
- It is best to have pain medication at home already for your surgery.
- If you have a prescription, have it filled prior to the surgery.
- **DO NOT** take Advil, Ibuprofen, or Naproxen for 48 hours after surgery.
